About En Piste

Since its incorporation in 1997, En Piste, the National Circus Arts Alliance, remains the only umbrella organization for circus arts professionals and organizations in Canada. With 411 members in 2019, it works to create conditions favourable to the development of the circus arts.

The circus is a unique ecosystem within the cultural sector. It is creative, diverse and innovative. In a matter of years, the circus arts have become an inspiring global benchmark and a universal source of pride.

The artists, artisans, cultural workers and organizations represented by En Piste work in all areas of the sector, from training to creation, production, promotion and social circus.

Its mission focuses on the following key principles:

- Bringing together organizations and individuals working in the community
- Developing, strengthening and promoting cohesion within the professional circus arts sector
- Advocating to the government on behalf of the sector to raise awareness of key issues and challenges
- Promoting the sector to local, national and international communities



2019 highlights

REMARKABLE PROGRESS

The 2019 fiscal year saw a considerable increase in the number of activities organized by En Piste for the circus arts sector. The number of community members who participate in our activities has grown steadily, which speaks to the relevance of En Piste and its essential contribution to the sector's development. En Piste has made remarkable and concrete progress with regard to its 2017-2027 Sector Development Plan, particularly in the following five areas:

- Building a pan-Canadian network
- Facilitating the adoption of a protective measure by the Commission des normes, de l'équité, de la santé et de la sécurité du travail (CNESST).
- Actively participating in the steering committee for the training network made up of the National Circus School (NCS), École de cirque de Québec, École de cirque de Verdun, École de cirque des Îles-de-la-Madeleine and École Horizon-Soleil.
- Carrying out an assessment focusing on promotion, with the aim of establishing a structuring project for circus arts circulation in Quebec.
- Conducting an economic survey of the circus arts in Quebec that demonstrates the wide-ranging impact of the sector while highlighting its precariousness and considerable vulnerability.

ACTIVE COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

In 2019, 450 circus arts professionals took part in networking activities held in Montréal and Quebec City, compared with 322 people in 2018, an increase of nearly 40%.

STABLE MEMBERSHIP NUMBERS THAT ATTEST TO THE RELEVANCE OF OUR WORK

In 2019, En Piste enjoyed the continued support of 411 members. Despite a small 3% dip compared to 2018, we consider our membership numbers to be relatively stable.

RECORD ATTENDANCE AND A FIRST WOMAN CHAIR

An impressive total of 13 members ran for positions on our board of directors. These members hailed from Ontario, New Brunswick, Newfoundland and Labrador and Quebec. After 16 years of involvement with the board, Samuel Tétreault stepped down as chair. Marie-Claude Bouillon, the current chair of the board, is the first woman to hold this position since En Piste was founded.

RELEVANT AND COMPELLING PERSPECTIVES ON LIFE AS AN ARTIST

The Circus Artists' Trajectories forum was attended by 125 people and held at The 7 Fingers' new premises. It featured 13 artists from different generations and a variety of origins and backgrounds. The day provided many opportunities for discussion and networking. For the event, we invited Juripop to give a presentation on the one-stop resource L'Aparté, a confidential and free service for members.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT: A KEY FOCUS

In 2019, a total of 1593 hours of workshops were offered, compared with 414 in 2018. This considerable increase can be attributed to the launch of new programs.

GROUP WORKSHOPS: ALWAYS HIGHLY APPRECIATED BY PARTICIPANTS

In 2019, 244 professionals from throughout Quebec participated in 28 group workshops, an increase of 50 participants compared to the previous year.

THE INDIVIDUALIZED SUPPORT PROGRAM: AN ESSENTIAL SERVICE FOR PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The first phase of the Individualized Training Support program was officially launched in January 2019 and was a resounding success. 59 circus artists from across Quebec received up to 20 hours of personalized support. The Individualized Career Support program has 22 participants.

CLOSER COLLABORATION TO EXPAND OUR RANGE OF WORKSHOPS

In addition to workshops in collaboration with other organizations, our partnership with Cirque du Soleil allowed us to offer a workshop at the St. John's International CircusFest for the first time. Partnerships with TOHU and Concordia University also resulted in two masterclasses.

PROGRESS THROUGH DOCUMENTATION: FIVE ONGOING STUDIES IN 2019

In addition to conducting two studies in 2019, which focused on promotion and the economic impact of the circus arts, we participated in a study on performing arts show attendance and a working group on artist career transitions. We also continued our participation in a study on digital mediation.

A WIDELY ACCESSIBLE INSURANCE PROGRAM

The number of participants in our group insurance program continues to grow, increasing from 99 in 2018 to 106 in 2019. Seven circus companies have now joined the program, two more than in 2018.

MORE BENEFITS AND PRIVILEGES FOR MEMBERS ACROSS CANADA

We nearly doubled our member benefits and privileges program, with 42 partners offering discounts online and to members in Montréal, Québec, Toronto, Calgary and Vancouver.

A DYNAMIC ALLIANCE

We undertook various initiatives, developed new programs and projects, improved our administrative procedures, relocated downtown and began redesigning our website. We are therefore very proud to have attained the majority of our goals and to have achieved excellent results.

REMARKABLE PROGRESS

Since 2017, we have continued to advocate for the implementation of the 2017-2017 sector development plan, *Extending our reach – For the national development of the circus arts.* Our advocacy has resulted in a number of major steps forward for the community. The following is an overview of the key work carried out in 2019.

THE PAN-CANADIAN NETWORK TAKES SHAPE

Despite ongoing efforts and reduced membership fees, recruiting members outside Quebec remains a challenge. There are currently just over 30 members from Canadian provinces other than Quebec. Nevertheless, the number of members outside Quebec did increase by 4% in 2019. We have stepped up our efforts to strengthen ties with circus communities in the rest of the country. Due to the many different needs and the diversity of experience from one region to another, there is a crucial need to build a pan-Canadian network to develop the circus arts in Canada

The development of the circus arts in Canada is progressing and we remain the only organization dedicated to supporting the professional sector in Canada. It is important to note that the Canada Council for the Arts (CCA) provides \$35,000 in annual funding to support our national mission. Despite our very modest resources, we do everything we can to support our community. Even with this funding, we have not been able to hire a resource person to coordinate the network and better document needs, identify priorities, and seek funding to organize activities in various provinces. Nevertheless, we provide bilingual communications and our web-

site redesign, which began in 2019, will provide a digital showcase for the circus arts and allow us share news about our community more widely.

Since fall 2019, members outside Quebec have been able to register for workshops, despite being ineligible for the rate subsidized by Emploi-Québec. In addition, our partnership with Cirque du Soleil made it possible for us to offer a workshop at the St. John's International CircusFest for the first time. This workshop, entitled *The circus artist as an agent for social change*, was led by Emmanuel Bochud. In fall 2019, En Piste was actively involved in addressing the challenges surrounding the development of the circus arts in New Brunswick. Our group insurance program remains accessible throughout Canada. Since January 2019, we have established partnerships with three suppliers who offer benefits and privileges to our members in Toronto, Calgary and Vancouver.

In June 2019, En Piste was also invited to speak about the alliance at the inaugural Ontario Circus Showcase in Toronto. Following two meetings with seven leaders from Ontario, Alberta, Newfoundland and Labrador, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Quebec, one at the International Market of Contemporary Circus (MICC) in Montréal in July 2019 and the other at the St. John's International CircusFest in September 2019, a joint grant application was submitted to the CCA to develop a pan-Canadian network. It proposed a series of consultations in provinces and territories throughout Canada in 2020, with the eventual aim of organizing a major national circus arts meeting in 2021. By the end of 2019, we were still awaiting confirmation of funding for this project.

WORKING TOWARDS A PROTECTIVE MEASURE FOR ARTISTS DURING THEIR TRAINING

Throughout the year, we continued to work with the Ministère de la Culture et des Communications du Québec (MCCQ) and the Conseil des arts et des lettres du Québec (CALQ) to reach an agreement with the CNESST to protect circus artists during their training. En Piste will oversee this measure. This project is included in measure 16 of the Quebec government's 2018-2023 culture action plan, which was unveiled along with its new cultural policy in June 2018. The measure is essential to ensure that artists are protected by the CNESST in the event of an injury or accident during a supervised training session not governed by an employment contract. A similar measure has existed in the dance sector since 1994. We hope that once this measure is adopted in Quebec, we will be able to persuade other provinces to follow suit.

FURTHER WORK TO DEVELOP A TRAINING PATHWAY

In 2018, the MCCQ awarded the National Circus School \$1 million to develop a training pathway for the circus arts in Quebec. The steering committee is made up of the National Circus School (NCS), École de cirque de Québec, École de cirque de Verdun, École de cirque des Îles-de-la-Madeleine, École Horizon-Soleil and En Piste. It met several times throughout the year. Its work will extend into 2023 and will focus on various issues pertaining to basic training, recreational training and teaching content. Its objective is to structure and equip schools

AN ASSESSMENT EXAMINING DISSEMINATION

In 2019, with financial support from the CALQ and in collaboration with Simon Bastien of BIP Research and performing arts consultant Sylvie Blais, we conducted a study on circus arts dissemination. To collect input, we took advantage of the MICC to hold a discussion group led by Esther Charron with some twenty international promoters. The study once again confirmed the need for

an assistance measure for circus show circulation in Quebec. We submitted a funding application to the CALQ and are also awaiting confirmation of funding for this project.

While waiting for a structuring project to be implemented, we organized our first networking activity between promoters and companies at the Capitole de Québec during RIDEAU 2019. Eighty-three people attended the 5@cirque, including 36 promoters and 15 circus companies. For this activity, we created a brochure showcasing nearly 30 shows available for touring. This initiative once again demonstrated the importance of implementing a structuring project to bring artists, companies and promoters together, draw attention to the variety of shows and realities of promotion and touring, and raise awareness of the circus throughout Quebec and Canada.

A FIRST ECONOMIC SURVEY DEMONSTRATES THE MAJOR CONTRIBUTION OF THE CIRCUS ARTS

Since the sector development plan was published in 2017, our government partners have not allocated any funding to support the growth of the circus arts sector and safeguard its future. In light of the growing challenges facing the circus arts sector, 59 organizations, nine promoters and 42 schools were asked to participate in a first economic survey of the circus arts sector in Quebec. Conducted in partnership with AppEco and led by economist Pierre-Emmanuel Paradis, the study not only demonstrated the circus arts' contribution to the cultural economy, but also highlighted major challenges if the sector is to remain creative, innovative and competitive in the short- and medium-term, given that 90% of its revenue comes from exporting shows and numbers abroad. The study is expected to conclude and be published in early 2020.

Active community engagement

Each year, in an effort to gather the community, work together and encourage community engagement based on common issues, we organize activities to promote collaboration and networking between members.

STABLE MEMBERSHIP NUMBERS THAT ATTEST TO THE RELEVANCE OF OUR WORK

Over the last five years, our membership numbers have risen steadily. On December 31, 2019, we had 411 members across all categories. While we consider these numbers to be relatively stable, there was a small 3% dip compared to 2018. This was mainly due to prolonged absences from the country, contracts abroad, leaves of absence due to injury, and career transitions. Given the high international mobility of artists and companies, we are proud of the results achieved.

The geographical breakdown of our membership shows that 85% of members came from Quebec, while 7% were from other Canadian provinces and 7% were from abroad; it is interesting to note this equal percentage. The proportion of members who chose French as their preferred language of correspondence was 78%. There was a 4% increase in the number of members outside Quebec and a 3% increase in the number of Anglophones.

RECORD ATTENDANCE AND A FIRST WOMAN CHAIR

Held on April 15, 2019, at The 7 Fingers' new creation centre in Montreal, the 2019 AGM Forum brought together over 125 professionals. Chaired by Sylvie Gamache, the annual general meeting provided an opportunity to review our achievements in 2018 and look ahead to 2019. The event was livestreamed and the video was available to view online for several days.

The board of directors is made up of 16 members: seven corporate members, four training organizations and five individual members. Board members are elected by members at the AGM for a two-year term. In 2019, an impressive total of 13 members ran for eight vacant positions. Of the six female candidates and seven male candidates, three were from Ontario, New Brunswick and Newfoundland and Labrador, with the 10 others hailing from Quebec.

Four new board members were elected: Nicolas Boivin-Gravel, Anahareo Doelle, Jimmy Gonzalez and Itzel Viruega. Marie-Ève Dicaire, Éric Langlois, Karine Lavoie and Tim Roberts were re-elected. For professional reasons, Nicolas Boivin-Gravel stepped down and the board appointed Nathalie Blanchet. We would like to thank everyone who expressed interest in contributing to community life. We would also like to acknowledge the significant contribution made by outgoing board members Yannick Mainville and Vincent Messager. Futhermore, after 16 years of unwavering commitment as a board member, including six years as chair, Samuel Tétreault announced his departure at the AGM. We are very grateful for his extensive involvement in the community's development. Marie-Claude Bouillon was elected chair of the board, the first woman to hold this position.

RELEVANT AND COMPELLING PERSPECTIVES ON LIFE AS AN ARTIST

Focusing on the theme of life as a circus artist and entitled *Circus Artists' Trajectories*, the 2019 edition of the forum proved to be exceptionally popular. More than 125 people participated, compared with 100 in 2018 and 60 in 2017.

Three panel discussions led by Esther Charron featured 13 artists from different generations and a variety of origins and backgrounds. Each panel provided an opportunity to discuss issues related to innovation, touring and the sensitive topic of career transitions with the following individuals:

Representatives from the CALQ and the Conseil des arts de Montréal (CAM) took part in the event. Juripop was also in attendance to present its legal services and L'Aparté, a free, confidential and independent service that assists individuals working in the cultural community who have experienced harassment or violence. The forum ended with discussion groups to brainstorm innovative ideas and effective, concrete solutions to the challenges discussed in the panel discussions. The day then concluded with a lively 5@cirque networking event.

We would like to express our heartfelt gratitude to The 7 Fingers and its staff members Elfy Andrade and Nicolas Lemieux for their help organizing the event. Their collective efforts helped make the day a success.

HIGHER PARTICIPATION IN NETWORKING OPPORTUNITIES

Supporting professional networking is crucial to promote discussion and collaboration. For the second consecutive year, we continued our 5@cirque series in order to hold regular networking activities and discuss common challenges. As many as 450 circus arts professionals participated in these events. In addition to our participation in RIDEAU and the 5@cirque held at the end of the forum, 133 producers, promoters, artists and circus arts professionals from all over the world took part in our event during the MICC. Finally, 33 artists and creators attended the information session to mark the launch of Impact, the CAM's new circus arts residency developed in collaboration with En Piste and other partners.

Supporting professional development: a key focus

We play an essential role in professional development and offer a variety of services: group workshops, an insurance program, and a wide range of benefits and privileges exclusively for members. In 2019, we also launched the new individualized training support program and reworked the individualized career support program. As a result of these changes, we were able to increase the number of participants and triple the number of workshop hours (1573 hours in 2019 compared with 414 hours in 2018). More than a hundred instructors helped to broaden participants' knowledge.

Our training activity planning reflects the needs identified in the 2018 macro-sectoral study on continuing education. The wide range of needs, number of disciplines to cover and international mobility of artists and workers all present a major challenge when planning and carrying out activities. The study also highlighted the urgent need to support artists during their training. Due to the very wide range of discipline-specific needs and participant levels, we made access to individual support a priority. We also explored new partnerships in order to expand our range of activities. We should note that funding for continuing education is mainly provided by the province of Quebec, which restricts our ability to offer programming outside Quebec.

Despite our limited funding, we hope to make our continuing education program even more relevant and available to as many professionals as we can, in as many provinces and territories as possible. For this reason, we opened our workshops to non-Quebec residents. In 2019, we were also able to offer a workshop in Newfoundland and Labrador for the very first time thanks to a partnership with Cirque du Soleil.

GROUP WORKSHOPS: ALWAYS HIGHLY APPRECIATED BY PARTICIPANTS

More than 244 participants took part in 28 group workshops. Despite the major overhaul of our individualized support program, the number of participants was virtually the same as in 2018¹. Our workshop programming is discussed with a training committee and reflects

priorities identified by the community. Participants gave it an average rating of 92%. For the 2019 fiscal year, Emploi-Québec provided budget support for the regional and multiregional streams and remains our key partner.

Compétence Culture renewed its financial support to enable us to hire a continuing education coordinator. We were also able to open workshops to Quebec residents with an open or closed work permit, giving more members of the circus community access to subsidized rates.

As in previous years, continuing education activities focused on five areas of expertise: discipline-specific skills, related skills, management, best practices and the creative process. The number of participants in creative workshops was particularly impressive.

INDIVIDUALIZED SUPPORT PROGRAMS: AN ESSENTIAL SERVICE

Given the wide range of needs and international mobility of artists and workers, we had to shift the focus of our programs. We therefore reviewed the individualized support programs that were offered in 2018. As a result, there are now two streams: the individualized career support program (Compétences-Carrières), which covers training needs related to career development, and the individualized training support program. Both programs have been an overwhelming success. At least a hundred participants benefitted from more than 1,183 hours of individual support from 66 trainers. This is three times as many participants as in 2018².

The individualized training support program addresses an urgent need expressed by the majority of respondents in the survey of circus artists' training habits in Quebec and the macro-sectoral study conducted by Daigle/Saire in 2018. It is important to note that these programs are available in all regions of Quebec.

CLOSER COLLABORATION TO EXPAND OUR RANGE OF WORKSHOPS

In addition to the workshop held in Newfoundland and Labrador at the St. John's International CircusFest in September 2019, we wanted to take advantage of visiting artists and leading experts to offer masterclasses to the community. In partnership with TOHU and Concordia University, 22 artists had the opportunity to attend a workshop with Sean Gandini during the Montréal Complètement Cirque festival. The workshop was preceded by a presentation. In November 2019, an acrobatic exploration workshop led by the Australian company Circa was also held at TOHU.

Furthermore, En Piste was able to offer eight interdisciplinary workshops to our sector thanks to funding provided to the Conseil de formation continue (CFC) by Services-Québec:

- Graphic design 101 for cultural workers in partnership with the Conseil québécois de la musique
- Physical acting in partnership with DynamO Théâtre and the Conseil québécois du théâtre
- Leveraging the connections between digital culture and digital thinking in partnership with the Conseil québécois des arts médiatiques
- *Understanding indigenous realities* in partnership with the Regroupement des arts interdisciplinaires du Québec
- NPO taxation in partnership with the Conseil québécois des arts médiatiques
- Effective time management and priority-setting in partnership with the Regroupement des centres d'artistes autogérés du Québec
- Understanding inclusion, diversity and cultural appropriation challenges and their effects on artistic practice in partnership with the Regroupement québécois de la danse
- Development strategies for international arts promotion in partnership with the Conseil québécois de la musique

PROGRESS THROUGH DOCUMENTATION: FIVE ONGOING STUDIES IN 2019

In addition to the study on circus arts dissemination and the economic survey mentioned previously, En Piste participated in a working group on performing arts show attendance, which tasked Daigle/Saire Conseil en management with conducting a study on performing arts show attendance in Quebec. The data collected will be used to better understand the types of audiences who attend circus shows and to inform our sector's promotion and mediation strategies.

En Piste also took part in a working group on artist career transitions, which led to an MCCQ-funded pilot project and study to assess the career transition needs of certain performing artists and determine the types of services that should be offered to support them more effectively. In February 2019, five circus artists were selected to receive personalized support over a three-year period to help redefine their career path. They will also receive free access to programs, services and financial support from the Quebec office of the Dancer Transition Resource Centre (DTRC). In addition, research conducted by a team of researchers at the Université de Montréal and Université Laval will help document performing artists' career transition behaviours and needs. Finally, En Piste continued its participation in a study on digital mediation in collaboration with the Research Laboratory on Cultural Audiences at the Université du Québec à Trois-Rivières.

A UNIVERSALLY ACCESSIBLE INSURANCE PROGRAM

En Piste continued its partnership with Assurances Vézina to offer the circus community a wide range of insurance products: group insurance for individuals in the event of an accident, group insurance for companies and organizations, liability insurance, goods and equipment insurance, travel insurance, insurance for directors and managers, and insurance for expats.

The number of participants in our group insurance program for individuals in the event of an accident rose slightly from 99 in 2018 to 106 in 2019, a third of individual members. The program is available to anyone with Canadian citizenship, permanent resident status or a work permit, and covers worldwide travel for training and performance purposes. Seven circus companies have now joined the group insurance program, two more than in 2018.

MORE BENEFITS AND PRIVILEGES FOR MEMBERS ACROSS CANADA

We have considerably expanded the member benefits and privileges program. Located in Montreal, Quebec City, Toronto, Calgary and Vancouver, our partners grew from 23 in 2018 to 43 in 2019. In addition, four benefits are offered online and are available anywhere. Our partners provide our members with a variety of products and services in the following areas: healthcare, circus training, training and recreation, legal services, career development, apparatuses and equipment, knowledge building, cultural life and networking, and accommodation and travel.

A dynamic alliance

While the 2018 fiscal year was a period of maturity, the 2019 fiscal year was characterized by genuine growth. Not only did we launch several new projects in addition to organizing our regular activities, we also began the process of relocating. Given the amount of growth in recent years, our lack of office space was glaringly apparent. In December 2019, we relocated to 1450 City Councillors Street in downtown Montreal. We now have space in our new office to welcome our members and provide staff with a more comfortable work environment. We would like to thank the National Circus School for hosting the alliance since it was founded.

This step marks the beginning of another important phase of our development. The 2019 fiscal year was also the fourth year of our strategic development plan. We are very proud to have attained the majority of our objectives. In 2019, we improved our administrative procedures, implemented a new classification and archiving plan, and adopted an anti-harassment policy. In addition to coping with a greater workload due to a larger volume of activities, we are proud to have adhered to excellent financial management practices while carrying out large-scale projects (relocating, replacing furniture and redesigning the website).

Given the many projects undertaken in 2019, we were unable to finish developing a communications plan. Nevertheless, the communication strategies that were implemented have paid off.

The En Piste website redesign, which began in September 2018 in collaboration with Mbiance, was completed in 2019. The process proved to be longer and more challenging, complex and costly than expected. Designing the new digital platform required numerous drafts of the project specifications, a thorough revision of textual content by Dialecto Web based on new web referencing and writing techniques, and graphic design by Dominique Jutras of Curieux Design and inspired by our new brand image. Due to the complexity of the platform, we were unable to launch our new website in 2019. Nevertheless, we are very proud of the progress that was made.

In October 2019, in order to move forward with the project and boost our social media influence, we hired a communications and digital strategies assistant with the help of an Emploi-Québec wage subsidy. This additional resource made it possible to complete work on the website and provide support to its users. It also allowed us to revive our previously inactive Instagram account and promote our services to a younger community of circus performers. However, it is important to note that En Piste was unable to hire an employee to oversee digital development like many other associations, alliances and regional councils for culture. We have continued to advocate to obtain this resource.

In 2019, we reached out to various communities through our communications:

- 11 bilingual monthly newsletters sent to over 2,700 subscribers
- 36 special and relevant communications about announcements, studies, events and membership drives, as well as numerous reminders
- 23 newsletters related to continuing education activities for circus artists and professionals
- 500+ more followers on our Facebook page, from 3,135 in 2018 to 3,666 in 2019. This reflects the expansion of our international community
- Fewer posts on Twitter (only 59 tweets) in order to focus on Facebook (a total of 329 posts and 26 events)
- We became active on Instagram (late November 2019), with a total of 26 posts shared with 615 followers in 2019

Continued advocacy on your behalf

In 2019, in addition to its annual meetings with arts councils, En Piste approached various government bodies in Quebec and Canada to obtain support for activity development and the sector's growing needs.

Each year, we meet with representatives of various ministries and leaders of arts councils to raise awareness of the issues and challenges faced by our community. We also participate in various working committees in the cultural sector:

- Member of the steering committee and member of the Coalition La culture, le cœur du Québec. We supported their efforts to implement an HR plan for culture and obtain a 2% increase in the government arts and culture budget.
- Our executive director was appointed to the position of chair of Compétence Culture for the third consecutive year.
- Board member of the Conseil de formation continue, Arts et culture de l'île de Montréal (CFC).
- Participant in a working group on performing arts show attendance, which conducted an extensive study examining promotion and dissemination challenges.
- Participant in a working group on artist career transitions.
- Participant in the Observatoire de la culture et des communications du Québec.

En Piste is also involved in various cultural organizations such as Les Arts et la Ville, National associations and alliances, CAPACOA, CINARS, Regional councils for culture and Diversité artistique Montréal (DAM). We are also present at circus arts shows and festivals.
